
ASPO 2024 Fireside Chat: Post-Event Summary

Summary: Conversation Circles

During the Conversation Circles, we invited attendees to discuss key questions related to the day's topics. The conversation summaries below will inform next steps in ASPO's priorities and supports.

1. Structural Barriers

ASPO staff reported¹ on structural barriers to i) access to post-secondary education, and ii) access programs, as identified by the access community in APUF applications and final reports.

1.	What are some promising practices that have helped you address structural barriers?	 Responsive Programming: Designing programs to meet participants' needs. Strategic Outreach: Personalized recruitment and expanded outreach to underrepresented groups. Awareness: Increasing awareness of programs and support through various channels. Continuum of Support: Providing comprehensive support throughout participants' tenure from access to academic programs. Access-First Approach: Opt-out models for professional and second-entry programs. Collaboration: Leveraging tri-campus strengths and partnerships. 	
2.	Are there any other structural barriers that are top of mind in your work?	 Representation: Hiring diverse faculty and staff to reflect program participants. Institutional Brand Identity: Addressing perceptions of elitism. Educational Value Proposition: Addressing perceptions around investing in one's education and its connections to

4.	Which topics would you prioritize for greater collaboration, innovation or developing shared practices as an access community?	 Partnerships: Strategic recruitment and relationship building. Budgeting: Allocating funds for program needs. Pipelines/Pathways: Connecting alumni and joint programming. Communications: Methods for sharing best practices and developing a CRM system for access programs. 	

3. Partnerships

ASPO staff shared survey findings³ about the types of partnerships (internal or external) and the partnership agreements (formal, informal, quasi-formal) featured in our access programs.

2.	What are some helpful practices for maintaining longstanding community partnerships?	 Footwork: Commitment to foundational tasks. Time Investment: Achieving more with long-term partners. 	
3.	What are key considerations for access programs as they build and maintain sustainable partnerships?	 Recruitment Strategy: Inspirational vs. aspirational approaches. Cultural Congruence: Being culturally appropriate in recruitment. Relationship Dynamics: Managing boundary tensions. Staffing: Ensuring fully funded, permanent staff. Storytelling: Sharing success stories.
